Impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the LGBTQ+ community in San Mateo County: a community-centered needs assessment

Background

- The COVID-19 pandemic has disproportionately impacted many underserved and vulnerable communities
- To our knowledge, there hasn't been a specific, targeted effort to look at how COVID-19 has affected LGBTQ+ community members in San Mateo County
- Knowing this information will help guide San Mateo County to better support the LGBTQ+ community during the pandemic

Community partner

The Pride Center is the first and only LGBTQ+ center in San Mateo County. The Pride Center offers a broad range of programs for LGBTQ+ community members of all ages, including direct mental health services, social events, and educational programming.

Project description

- Online survey assessed the impacts of COVID-19 on financial stability, housing stability, safety and access to supportive resources, mental and emotional health, and physical health
- The survey was distributed by the Pride Center and community partners, and the survey was also made available in alternative phone and paper formats

Survey results

532 participants 21% gender-d 100+ narrative comments 78% non-hete

21% gender-diverse participants 78% non-heterosexual participants

Gender-diverse participants were <u>2.6x more likely</u> than cis participants to have experienced violence or harassment

Participants with disabilities were <u>7.3x more likely</u> than participants without disabilities to have moved into unsafe/unstable housing

Non-white participants were **2.5x more likely** than white participants to have had trouble getting stipend checks/unemployment benefits

Percentages of negative impacts reported by all participants 36% Financial stability18% Housing stability

85% Emotional or mental health

65% Physical health

17% Safety or access to supportive resources

Lessons learned

- COVID-19 has significantly impacted the LGBTQ+ community in San Mateo County and this survey helps to identify the magnitude of these impacts
- Many people left narrative comments, meaning that the community really wanted to share their stories and have their voices heard!
- Important intersections of identity include but are not limited to race, income, and ability status

- There were limits to digital survey distribution, including differential access to technology, wi-fi, and social media accounts
- It's important to prioritize inclusivity, accessibility, and transparency when collecting stories and experiences from community members
- It's important that we have the resources and infrastructure to collect data about the LGBTQ+ community

Reflections and next steps

- There is clearly an urgent need to address the immense impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the LGBTQ+ community in San Mateo County
- The disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on community members with multiple minority identities underscores the importance of resources, programming, and support specifically for community members who don't benefit from specific axes of privilege
- The Pride Center will target programs and services towards the identified areas of need
- Next steps include securing funding to enhance the Pride Center's programmatic work, prioritizing the work of the Pride Center's mental health team, and enhancing the capacitybuilding work of the Pride Center and other community partners in San Mateo County
- Continue to collect information, stories, and experiences from the LGBTQ+ community to identify and refine specific needs
- The most important element is working with community, for community
